
Niagara Region Right to Life offers *The Father Ted Colleton Scholarship* essay contest as part of its mandate to reach out to society in an educational format. In particular, Niagara Region Right To Life wishes to help educate and inform the younger generations about the preciousness and possibilities of human life from conception to natural death and how certain threats affect those possibilities in its beginnings.



FATHER TED COLLETON: AN INTRODUCTION

- Father Edward (Ted) Colleton (b. 1913- d. 2011) promoted pro-life principles and values for almost seven decades.
- Born in Dublin, Ireland in 1913, he entered the Spiritan Order in 1932, was ordained a priest in 1940 and was assigned to serve in Kenya. Forced to leave that mission field in 1971, he was reassigned to Canada, a nation that was bent on liberalizing its abortion laws.
- He joined the pro-life movement and set about educating the public, especially his beloved young people, about the tragedy of abortion. For more than 35 years Father Ted was a compelling pro-life writer and speaker, gentle teacher, committed activist, and raconteur par excellence, communicating to hundreds of thousands of people. He was arrested and briefly jailed for his witnessing against the evil of abortion laws or lack thereof.
- Father Ted believed that prayer was the most important action of human beings in winning the right to life for unborn generations present and to come. He died peacefully on April 26, 2011. His life work inspires many far and wide.



Scholarship Awards

As many as three prizes are offered: \$1500.00 first prize, \$800 second prize and \$500 third prize. A writing contest organized by Niagara Region Right to Life is a determining factor in the awarding of the scholarship prizes.

Eligible candidates must:

- be senior high school students (grade 11 or 12) attending a high school (or be homeschooled) in Canada
- submit one letter of reference from a school staff member or community representative
- provide a brief self-profile outlining participation in school life/community activities and a description of their interest/involvement in the pro-life cause and
- the student must submit a typed original essay, approximately 1,200 words in length, accompanied by proper documentation/annotation of content presented. The essay plus other documents should be submitted preferably by email to dirocco@theinterim.com and if by regular mail it must be postmarked no later than Monday, December 2, 2019. *The essay theme or topic for this year's program is the following:*

"Why has the womb, traditionally the safest place in the world, become the most dangerous, unprotected place in the world?"

Program: Rules and Regulations

This responsibility rests with a committee selected by Niagara Region Right To Life

Copyrights to any essay submitted for the purpose of the contest will be retained by Niagara Region Right To Life. Any publication or other use of the work would be acknowledged by naming its author. Please note that prize winners are asked to provide a photo of themselves so it may accompany the publication of their essay.

Students related to employees or volunteers of Niagara Region Right To Life are ineligible, as are previous prize winners in this scholarship program.

Announcement of winning entry

The winners will be declared by Monday, February 1, 2021 via an announcement by Niagara Region RTL. Criteria for the selection of winners include the quality of essays submitted. Lack of prior involvement in the pro-life movement does not disqualify the students from the scholarships.

Check off the following to make certain you have included all the necessary documentation. !

- a) One letter of reference from teacher or community representative.
- b) Type-written essay (1,200 words) with proper citations.
- c) Self-profile outlining your leadership and involvement in your school, community and/or church.
